Flag Day

Celebrated on June 14

Did You Know ... ?



1. Flag Day in the United States is celebrated on June 14, commemorating the adoption of the Stars and Stripes as the American flag on June 14, 1777 by resolution of the Second Continental Congress.
2. Waubeka, Wisconsin is the city that claims to be the national birthplace of Flag Day when Bernard J. Cigrand held the first recognized formal observance of Flag Day at the Stony Hill School in 1885.
3. Sarah Hinson, a school teacher in Buffalo, NY, began Flag Day exercises, teaching the children to salute the flag and repeat the Pledge of Allegiance to instill respect for the flag in her students in 1891.
4. Historians credit two early designs of the U.S. flag to an author, judge, and composer who was also a signer of the Declaration of Independence, Francis Hopkinson.
5. The 48-star flag was in effect for 47 years. The 50-star flag is the longest used version and has been in use for over 60 years. It was ordered by President Dwight D. Eisenhower on August 21, 1959.
6. In accordance with Flag Code Sec. 7(m), the President and the Governor of a state are the only persons who can legally order a flag to be flown at half-staff in mourning of a highly regarded figure.
7. The blue rectangle containing 50 stars is known as the "Union." The flag's stripes represent the 13 British Colonies that declared independence.
8. Modern scholars do not generally accept the story that Betsy Ross was hired by a group of American founders to design the flag. However, it is documented that Ross produced uniforms, tents, and flags for the Continental forces.
9. The week of June 13 - 19, 2021, is designated as National Flag Week.
10. Mary Young Pickersgill received the contract to make the large flag flown over Ft. McHenry during the 1814 British attack. It was 30 x 42 feet and weighed 50 pounds.

PETTY OFFICER KWAME KUSIAPPIAH, USN - Logistics Specialist First Class (Aviation Warfare/Surface Warfare) Kwame Kusiappiah, USN, is a well-rounded model Sailor and leader. His remarkable selfless contributions in volunteerism are truly impressive. His goal to improve the partnership between the United States Navy and the Santa Rosa and Escambia County communities is an ongoing vigorous effort. Throughout the year, Petty Officer Kusiappiah has volunteered in a wide variety of organizations throughout the local community. He certified, recruited, organized, and participated in events reaching every socio-economic demographic in the community through Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Pensacola (BBBS), Naval Air Station Pensacola, United Service Organization (USO) and Elementary Schools. As the only Command President's Volunteer Service Award (PVSA) Certifying Official, he personally organized and

certified more than 3,000 volunteer hours, rewarding seven PVSAs to service members. Petty Officer Kusiappiah is the exact testament of extraordinary leadership in action and is highly deserving of being recognized by the awarding of the George Washington Honor Medal.

OFFICER MARY WILLIAMS-GREEN - For the past 5 years she has been the SRO, the School Resource Officer at Pensacola High School. FAVOR HOUSE - Healing Domestic Abuse Victims -

SUE HAND and MARCIA TRAVIS, have worked for 35 years providing guidance, shelter and support - both physical and emotional to parents and children in the Escambia/Santa Rosa County area. In 2019, they housed 400 women and children in the shelters and served another 800 with counseling. A 24-hour crisis telephone line is located

within the shelter facilities and at two outreach centers. In addition to providing security, Favor House administers a scholarship program for career development. The second part of their mission is to hold offenders accountable. Favor House attorneys represent victims and petition the court for orders of protection at no charge.

JALEN BENSON, a first year medical student at Harvard Medical School, was sent home to Pensacola in March of 2020 due to the coronavirus. Wanting to help healthcare workers and learn from the pandemic, he founded the National Student Response Network (NSRN), to connect healthcare students around the country to areas where volunteers were needed. In a matter of weeks, the program grew to over 5,000 student volunteers, who were delivering PPE equipment, contact tracing, providing food delivery for the elderly and phlebotomy. NSRN directors in all 50 states worked to connect with public health departments, hospitals and nonprofits to provide volunteers.

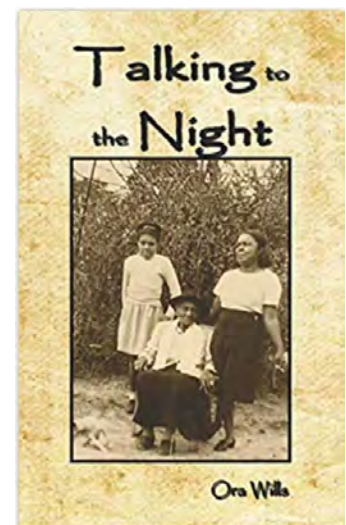
Educator - George Washington Honor Medal
